





## BEST FOR OLD-SCHOOL OPULENCE Island Shangri-La, Hong Kong

Make a grand statement by staying in the shimmering tower of Island Shangri-La, an architectural landmark soaring over Hong Kong. With spectacular views over Victoria Harbour, the 56-storey hotel boasts the world's largest Chinese silk painting, spanning an amazing 16 floors in the breathtaking atrium. The plush Asianinspired interior design includes 771 chandeliers and the new Horizon Club is the highest in the city. If all this leaves you feeling like splurging when you venture outside of the hotel, there's a fleet of limousines, including a Rolls-Royce Phantom, at your service. It's no surprise that it's the hotel of choice with just about every A-lister, member of royalty and head of state who visits Hong Kong. ## BEST FOR MINIMALISM Le Sereno, St Barths

It's the A-list hub of the Caribbean and the coolest place to stay on St Barths is minimalist haven Le Sereno. Designed by famed Parisian designer Christian Liaigre (who has worked on houses for the likes of Karl Lagerfeld), the style is understated with the natural world brought inside. The all-star design team included illustrious lighting designer Arnold Chan and landscape architect Enrique Blanco. The 37 suites and three four-bedroom villas are a hit with celebs such as Uma Thurman, Beyoncé and Michael Kors. ## BEST FOR RUSTIC CHARM

Babylonstoren, South Africa

Is this the chicest farm ever? Re-imagined by former style editor Karen Roos, Babylonstoren is a historic Dutch farm dating back to the 1690s. Yet the interiors of the 500-acre resort, which opened in South Africa in December 2010, definitely have a modern edge. The 12 luxury cottages blend rustic and modern, with airy interiors using creams and whites. There are glass-walled kitchens and a mix of antique and designer *objets d'art*. Surrounded by fruit groves and vegetable gardens, you can pick your own organic produce. Or, dine at Babel, a restaurant offering seasonal fare in a converted cowshed.
